

## Summary of the Differences in Rules & Regulations – Louisiana

Rules & Regs	Louisiana	Canada
<b>General Pari-Mutuel Rules</b>		
Breakage	-Breaks to a dime	-Breaks to a nickel. The association will continue to use these breaks.
<b>Pool Calculation &amp; Distribution</b>		
Win	-No winners pays on the place finisher, then pays on the show finisher.	-No winners pays on the next finisher until a winner is determined. No refund.
Place	-No winners pays on the other place finisher.	-No winners pays on the next finisher until a winner is determined. No refund.
Show	-No winners pays on the other show finishers.	-No winners pays on the next finisher until a winner is determined. No refund.
Exactor	-No winners pays on the 1-All and/or All-2.	-No winners pays 1-ALL, then refund.
Quinella	-Same as Canada	
Daily Double	-No winners pay profit split between 1-All & All-1, then 2-2, then refund.	-No winners pays a single price to the nearest winner in each leg, until a winner is found...No refund
Triactor	-No winners pay 1-2-All, then 1-All-3, then 1-All-All, then All-2-3.	-No winners pays 1-2-ALL, then 1-ALL-ALL, then refund.
Superfecta	-Same as Canada	
Pick 3 a.k.a. "Triple Play"	-No winners pay 2 of 3, then 1 of 3, and then carried forward to next day's pool. -All races must be cancelled for a refund to occur.	No winners pays 2 of 3, then pays 1 of 3, then pays on 2 <sup>nd</sup> place finisher then 3 <sup>rd</sup> and so on. No refund. -If any leg is cancelled before the first leg is made official, the entire pool is refunded.
Pick 4	-Only 1 method of distribution is used which is the daily mandatory method. -No winners pay 3 of 4, then 2 of 4, then 1 of 4, then refund. -All races must be cancelled for a refund to occur.	-6 methods of distribution are used which include the daily mandatory method, accumulated method, accumulated method with a split, accumulated method with a daily split, daily mandatory method whereby the pool has a major and minor share, and a accumulated method with a daily split whereby the pool has a major and minor share. -If any leg is cancelled prior to the first leg going Official, pool is refunded. -No winners pays 3 of 4, then 2 of 4, then 1 of 4, then pays on 2 <sup>nd</sup> place finisher then 3 <sup>rd</sup> and so on during the daily mandatory method. No refund. -Previous day's carryover will not be paid out if more than 50% of legs are cancelled during distribution method 2-4. 100% of net pool will be paid out, not including previous day's carryover to the greatest number of winners if at least one leg is cancelled for distribution method 6.
Pick 6 a.k.a. "Super 6"	-Only 1 method of distribution is used which is the accumulated method with a daily split. -30% of net pool plus any previous day's carryover will be paid out on a 6 of 6. 30% minor will be paid out to the next best winners. -If no 6 of 6 (major) then 70% of net pool will be carried forward. -All races must be cancelled for a refund to occur. However, if any race is cancelled, 100% of net pool will be paid to the most winners, not including previous day's carryover.	-6 methods of distribution are used which include the daily mandatory method, accumulated method, accumulated method with a split, accumulated method with a daily split, daily mandatory method whereby the pool has a major and minor share, and a accumulated method with a daily split whereby the pool has a major and minor share. -No winners pays 5 of 6, then 4 of 6, then 3 of 6, then 2 of 6, then 1 of 6, then pays on 2 <sup>nd</sup> place finisher then 3 <sup>rd</sup> and so on during the daily mandatory method. No refund. -If any leg is cancelled prior to the first leg going Official, pool is refunded. -Previous day's carryover will not be paid out if more than 50% of legs are cancelled during distribution method 2-4. 100% of net pool will be paid out, not including previous day's carryover to the greatest number of winners if at least one leg is cancelled for distribution method 6.
